Learning process is participatory and student involvement in essay competitions, seminars, quizs, etc is visible. ICT enabled teaching-learning is partially in place.
2.2.4	Teacher Quality :	 Out of total faculty four teachers are Ph.D. and 10 are M.Phil. degree holders. Faculty is appointed by College Governing body through open advertisement. Some faculty members have participated in Refresher/Orientation courses and seminars/Conferences.
2.2.5	Evaluation Process and Reforms:	 The institution follows University academic calendar and examinations are conducted by the affiliating University. Transparency of evaluation is ensured by re-checking, revaluation, re-addition and self-appraisal by students. Periodic internal tests are conducted.
2.2.6	Student Performance and Learning Outcomes	The student performance in terms of pass outs demonstrate declining trend. Students' results are better than University results.
